"A quilt greets you on many levels." - Ken Burns Just as a quilt is the product of countless hours of effort by an individual or group, the Historical Society Collection is the result of many generous donors who wanted their photograph, hat, basket or certificate to tell the story of Delaware County. Many volunteers give their time to inventory, catalog, safely store and select items for display. A quilt has many pieces of fabric. The thousands of objects, photos, books and documents preserve our history for future generations. We collect items made in or used in Delaware County (including quilts) and photographs/records of Delaware people, places and organizations. We may accept items, which are not connected to this county, but help educate about a time period in history.

"We wish we knew."- Medina County Historical Society Almost 100 photos of Civil War soldiers are in the Medina collection, but no one knows who they are. Many items on our shelves were received decades ago and have no attached documentation. The Collections Committee will examine these materials to determine if they are relevant to and illustrate our culture and history.

Nectar Candyland



One of the questions that we were asked at the Delaware County Fair last September, where our theme was Restaurants and Ice Cream Parlors and we featured the neon Nectar sign, was "Why did the Nectar close, and what details do you have about the family?" We searched our archives and finally have some answers.

The founder of Nectar, Nicholas A. Zanetos, was born on December 9, 1917 to Anthony N. and Lulu (Pathios) Zanetos who had immigrated to the United States from Greece in 1907. It was his father Anthony who first

entered the candy making business, as an apprentice in a shop in Columbus. By 1946 Nicholas was a resident of Delaware, and Nectar Candyland opened for business at 23 N. Sandusky on December 7 of that year (incidentally, the same year the letters for the Nectar sign were made).


Nicholas had married Nicki Vatsures on April 28, 1946, and they had three sons: Anthony, Thomas and Craig. Interestingly, the Vatsures family was also in the candy business – the Society has a photograph taken during the 1913 flood showing the Vatsures Candies shop on Sandusky street. Nicholas died on April 1, 1992 at Grady Memorial Hospital "after a long illness". Nicki died on July 6, 2015 at Willow Brook. Both are buried in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Anthony Zanetos, the oldest son, had taken over operation of the business, probably around 1989. In the late summer of 2008 there were two articles in the Delaware Gazette which explained that the building had been sold to a professional animator who planned to use it for his residence and studio and would be remodeling the first floor to rent out, and thus the Nectar

was relocating to 12 N. Sandusky. The letters from the old sign were restored and moved to the interior of the new shop; the marble slab and "The Nectar Candyland" sign were also moved there.

On November 13, 2010 another newspaper article announced that after 64 years in business the Nectar was closing. The headline read "Recession hits historic Delaware candy store" and details in the story said that they had been unable to find investors and were refused a bank loan in order to keep the business operating.

One further side note about the Zanetos candy connection: The Anthony-Thomas Candy Company, which has a number of stores throughout the Columbus area, was founded in 1952 by father Anthony Zanetos and brother Thomas (Nicholas also had another brother, John, and two sisters, Beulah and Frankie). The company has a fund-raising division which operates under the name "Nectar Candy Co., LLC" out of Delaware OH. 

The **Meeker Homestead Museum** will reopen with brand new exhibits on March 4, 2018. It will be open from 2 to 5 in the afternoon every Sunday until the end of the year. Docents will be available to lead guided tours and answer questions.

A new permanent exhibit on American Indians has been installed in one of the upstairs bedrooms. The exhibit includes information on local lore and a collection of prehistoric and historic artifacts. Eventually, a model of Pluggy's Town constructed by Hayes high school students and other items will be added. A standards-based instructional program for students entitled "American Indians in Delaware County" which complements this exhibit has been developed by the Curriculum Support Committee and will soon be offered to school groups.

In addition, there will be a temporary exhibit on "Notable Women of Delaware County", from March 4 through May 20. This thoughtful and fascinating exhibit will highlight the accomplishments of ten women who advanced Delaware County and our world by their deeds. Since March is
