The Democratic National Convention was held in Chicago amid riots and National Guardsmen. Graham Nash of Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young wrote the song "Chicago" about the events surrounding the convention and told listeners "We can change the world; rearrange the world." And indeed, I think we did. And still are.

We are so grateful to Coughlin's Crossing (our new neighbors at the development going in to the north of the Barn). Not only did they donate dirt from their excavation site, but their crew and equipment was used to create the mound which will now provide a tastefully landscaped buffer of trees, plantings and boulders, between US 23 and our property.

This buffer will greatly help reduce the road noise. Readings were taken before the mound was installed, and they maxed at 100 decibels. A 15 minute test after did not exceed 70 dBs near the gazebo and willow tree. Now that the mound is finally installed, we are working on obtaining signs for US 23 and Stratford Road.

We received a grant of \$8040 from the Ron Sabatino Family Fund through the Delaware County Foundation to purchase a new audio-visual system for the Barn at Stratford. We will be purchasing 2 larger screens and a better sound system which will allow better viewing when we have programs in the Barn.

Later this year, we will receive a Community Enhancement Grant of \$33,822.33 from the Delaware County Commissioners. These much-needed funds will be used for signage at the Meeker Homestead, preservation of newspapers and directories, barn kitchen renovations, and computer upgrades.

Carson's Quiz Answers (from front page)

- 1. One of the easiest ghost signs to read, the Strohm Meat sign is on the east facing wall at 12 W. Winter St., where Bun's Restaurant has been located since the fire which occurred in 2002.
- 2. Kurrley's Saloon was a saloon and pool room operated by Victor E. Kurrley at 9 N. Sandusky St. from about 1897 to 1900. What remains of this sign can best be seen by standing across the street in front of the Delaware Antique Mall and looking toward Son of Thurman.
- 3. The Bull Durham Tobacco sign is on the west facing wall at 9 E. William St. where the Upper Cut Barber Shop is currently located. Look closely to make out parts of the "Coca Cola" sign.

Juneteenth celebrates the day in which slavery was announced to be abolished: June 19, 1865. The event has since been celebrated across the country, largely in the African American community. The Delaware Community Coalition had a symbolic freedom walk and Juneteenth Celebration on June 16. The coalition's larger purpose is to increase dialogue between the various communities of larger Delaware.

The Delaware County Historical Society had an integral role in the event. Brent Carson provided a summary of the long history of Delaware's African American community. Nancy Fleming and Joe Dwenger (pictured) provided a piece of Underground Railroad history portraying Patience Meeker and William Cratty.




Oral History Project Interviewees Needed: Delaware County Historical Society and Columbus State Community College are partnering in an oral history project to record memories of life in Delaware County. Our topic for the fall semester is 1968. 1968 was a pivotal time in U.S. history, and we want to talk to people who were 15 years old or older in 1968 and who are willing to share their memories of that time. The interviews will last approximately 1 hour and will be conducted by Columbus State Community College students in late September, early October. The interviews will then be put into our DCHS archives to share with anyone who wants to know about 1968. We need at least 20 - 25 interviewees.
